Food poisoning: I acted for Cadbury's in the recent salmonella incident as an epidemiologist, and in several food poisoning incidents affecting large numbers of persons. I helped win a case in Reading acting for a nursery accused of causing food poisoning, after being cross examined in court for the equivalent of one full day. I have also acted as an expert witness in the Godstone *E coli* O157 incident, and the Fat Duck outbreak.

Other EXPERIENCE

SURVEILLANCE:

I was joint Editor of a book on surveillance, sponsored by the EU and my role included that of writing most of the 'general' section of the book. I was also invited in 1988 to Saudi Arabia to assist in a project on surveillance, and to Australia (Canberra) on a similar project in 1989 (see visits abroad). I visited Australia again as a Medibank Private Fellow, China on a WHO consultancy, and contributed to three editions of the Oxford Textbook of Public Health. I ran two surveillance projects in Europe (see below). I also wrote more than 100 weekly anonymous contributions to the Epidemiology Section of the British Medical Journal between 1971 and 1977.

The investigation of an outbreak of hepatitis B from tattooing (Lancet 1979) led eventually to the publication of guidelines for hygienic piercing for tattooists, acupuncturists, ear piercing, hair electrolysis. The paper on 'Hospital outbreak of *C.perfringens* food poisoning' (Lancet 1977) was the first to draw attention to the problems of cross immunity in hospitals.

The paper on 'Food poisoning from raw red kidney beans' (BMJ 1980) was the first to describe this new source of food poisoning. Outbreaks are now very rare.

An outbreak of hepatitis A among doctors following a dinner at the Apothecaries Hall in London, and 2 other outbreaks, were traced to a consignment of frozen raspberries picked and frozen 2 years earlier.

I also became heavily involved in the investigation of outbreaks of meningococcal meningitis, with several published papers.

RESEARCH

Hygienic Skin Piercing: My work on methods used by non-medical skin piercers was published as a booklet 'A Guide to Hygienic Skin Piercing' in 1983 (2200 copies). A law to control skin piercing was also passed. Guidelines now extend to include hair-dressing, beauty therapy and body piercing. A paper on aseptic procedures at a school of chiropody led to wide acceptance of the need for hygiene in chiropody amongst that profession. I am currently working with colleagues at the Centre for Infections [HPA] on a study of the prevalence of infection following skin piercing [now published in British Medical Journal]

Vaccination: My main interests have been in vaccine strategy, surveillance of vaccines and vaccine monitoring. There have been various publications on these subjects, including chapters in 2 books. Other papers on strategy, uptake and efficacy of vaccines have been published.

American People Ambassador Program, March 7 – 20 1998

I was appointed to lead a delegation of International Epidemiology Leaders in a special People to People mission to South Africa. The program was co-ordinated by the American People Ambassador Program of People to People International founded in 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower to bring people in contact with their contemporaries around the world. The then Honorary Chairman was President Clinton.

CONSULTANCIES

WHO/IEA on Epidemiology

In December 1987, Professor L. Gordis [Johns Hopkins] and I were appointed consultants by the Director General of WHO and the President of the IEA to investigate ways of improving and expanding the amount of epidemiological expertise throughout the world so as to meet the needs for the global strategy of "Health for All".

WHO on Acute Respiratory Infections

In December 1990 I was asked to chair an international meeting of experts on "Surveillance of Antibiotic Resistance for acute respiratory infections in developing countries" in WHO Geneva and was voted Chairman of the meeting. I successfully steered the meeting to a consensus and a report was published by WHO.

Surveillance of Infectious Diseases in Australia

In June/July 1989 I was asked by the Australian National University in Canberra to advise on the formation of a CDSC/CDC type centre for surveillance of infectious disease. I was asked to return for further work for a period of 2 months in Nov/Dec 1991 as Medibank Private Fellow.

WHO on Surveillance of Laboratory Infections:China, Beijing 1995

I discussed surveillance of infection using laboratories and helped train about 50 Chinese epidemiologists (using an interpreter) over two full days! and gave seminars for the WHO. Report made to WHO in Manila at the end of the visit.
